Comments:

The bulk of the book is taken up with campaign histories ranging over most of the South American continent. There is a section on uniforms \acute{o} the thing to note here is the similarity of many uniforms with $\~{o}$ traditional $\~{o}$ Napoleonic uniforms that many wargamers will already own. Detailed orders of battle (for both sides) are listed for the following battles: Chacabuc 1817, Maipu 1818, Boyaca 1819, Carabobo 1821, Ayacucho 1824.

There is no information on the enemies of Bolivar and San Martin and the coverage of British forces is a little out of proportion (too much) but on the whole this is the book you must read when starting out in this wargaming backwater.

For gamers with Napoleonic armies already in their collection, these conflicts are well worth investigating as there is a lot of cross-over with troops and uniforms, tactics are the same so existing rules will work nicely and the armies are generally much smaller.
